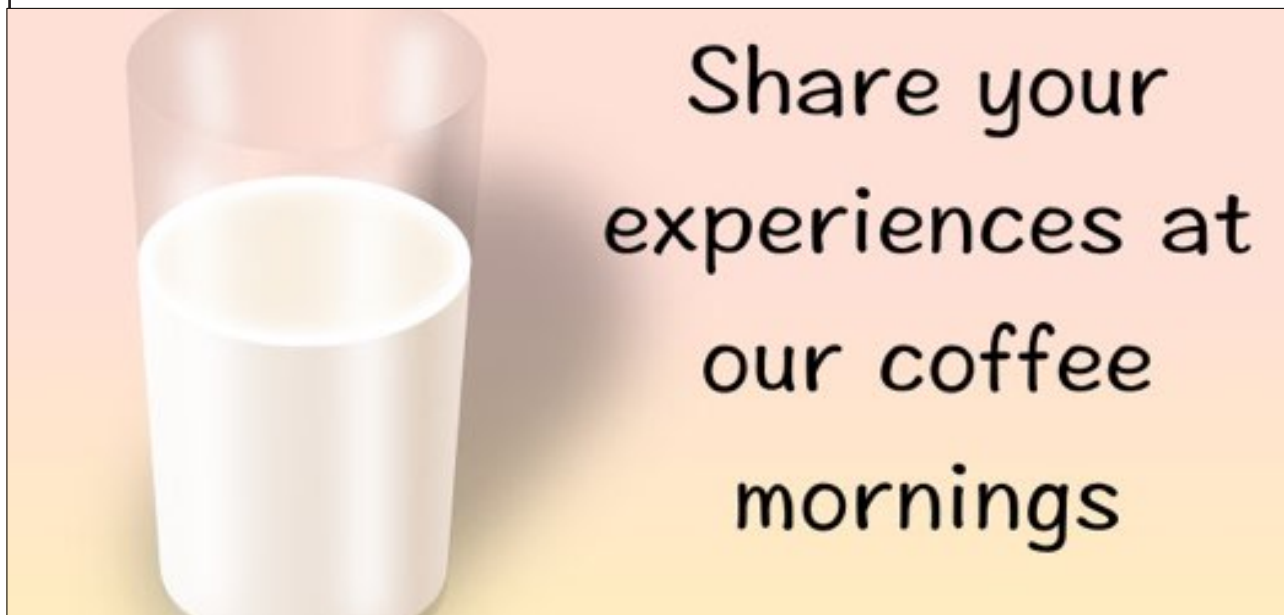
Let's all make this year, a year where we make a difference.

## Federal Government funding for PCFA's Prostate Cancer Specialist Nursing Service

The Federal Government has announced an investment of \$35.4m over the next four years in PCFA's Prostate Cancer Specialist Nursing Service.

The funding will support the employment of 86 Prostate Cancer Specialist Nurses around Australia, helping to bridge the gap in care between city and country areas.

Combined, PCFA's Commonwealth and community-funded Prostate Cancer Specialist Nursing Service now comprises 110 nurses at 90 different locations nationwide.

Importantly, the funding package will give 3 in 4 newly diagnosed men access to a specialist nurse close to home, which is a game-changing investment in saving lives.

## PBS listing of NUBEQA

On 16 November 2023 the then Acting Prime Minister Richard Marles and Health Minister Mark Butler announced the PBS listing of NUBEQA (darolutamide) for men with metastatic hormone sensitive prostate cancer.

Around 5,000 men are expected to benefit from the listing each year, saving \$42,000 in annual prescription costs.

PCFA led a national advocacy campaign to secure the PBS listing of this life-extending medication.

## Prostate and continence: A guide for men undergoing prostate surgery

The Continence Foundation of Australia has released a guide on continence for men undergoing prostate surgery.

If you've experienced urinary incontinence related to prostate cancer surgery, you may find this guide helpful.

The guide covers topics including exercising your pelvic floor muscles, drinking well, eating a healthy diet, and exercise.

The guide also looks at other ways to manage incontinence, including pads, condom drainage, and maintaining good skin care.

## Australia's first living lab to help beat prostate cancer

Australian researchers are among the first scientists in the world to establish a living lab to help find new treatments and therapies for deadly forms of prostate cancer.

The ground-breaking project, funded by PCFA, aims to help end Australian deaths from the disease.

The lab will expand on the capabilities of the Australian Prostate Cancer BioResource, a national collaboration currently managed by Monash University.

The existing biobank will be enriched by the inclusion of specimens and data from individuals with advanced metastatic disease, and will for the first time include unique collections of patient models of prostate cancer. These resources will then be available for access by prostate cancer researchers around the country.

### Studies help explain why some prostate cancers become resistant to hormone therapy

[Science Daily \(4 December 2023\)](#) reports on two new studies led by researchers from the UCLA Jonsson Comprehensive Cancer Center that give insight into how cells use energy to influence the way prostate tumours survive and grow. These advancements can help to explain why some prostate cancers become resistant to hormone therapy, the most commonly used treatment for men with advanced stages of the disease.

The new studies demonstrate a need to further study the link between metabolism and treatment resistance or treatment response. Understanding and controlling these changes could potentially help develop better treatments for prostate cancer.

### Prostate cancer report card now available

A prostate cancer 'report card' which outlines the outcomes of various treatments is now available to help prostate cancer patients and their families make more informed choices.

If you've been diagnosed with prostate cancer, you will know that there are many treatment approaches available to you, including:

- surgery;
- external beam radiotherapy;
- low dose rate brachytherapy;
- hormonal treatment;
- active surveillance; and
- watchful waiting.

The report card breaks down each treatment type and evaluates the survival, cancer recurrence, secondary treatment and impacts on urinary, bowel and sexual function for different prostate cancer

treatments, based on the experiences of men previously diagnosed with prostate cancer.

Knowing which treatment is best will depend on several factors – including aggressiveness and extent of spread of the cancer, as well as your fitness or presence of other disease.

### Potential new treatment for prostate cancer receives \$5M funding boost

A newly funded Monash University-led research program will investigate the potential of Chimeric Antigen Receptor T (CAR T) cell therapy, previously only effective in blood cancers, for the treatment of prostate cancer.

A multi-disciplinary and multi-institutional team of researchers has been awarded a \$5 million Synergy Grant from the National Health and Medical Research Council (NHMRC) to develop highly-tailored treatment regimens for prostate cancer, using next-generation CAR T cell therapy.

CAR T cell therapy uses the body's own immune system T cells and has transformed treatment for some blood cancers. However, CAR T cell therapy could also be effective in solid cancers, including prostate cancer, based on recent evidence published by members of the new Synergy team.

### Research supports early use of LuPSMA in prostate cancer

Peter Mac researchers have shown LuPSMA therapy can be safely used as a first-line treatment for men with newly diagnosed prostate cancer, potentially revolutionising treatment for aggressive forms of this cancer.

LuPSMA is an infusion containing

radioactive Lutetium-177 which is attracted to PSMA (Prostate Specific Membrane Antigen) on prostate cancer cells wherever they are in the body, killing these cells.

In the LuTectomy study, men with newly diagnosed, localised prostate cancer received upfront radiation treatment with LuPSMA before surgical removal of their prostate. The study showed LuPSMA therapy did not increase the technical

difficulty of later surgery or add to risk of post-operative complications, and was therefore safe to give to men ahead of prostate removal.

The researchers hope that this new application of LuPSMA therapy, before surgery, will ultimately cure more patients.
