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## Breaking news: MSAC ruling on Lutetium Imaging & Therapy

PCFA has just received word that Australia's Medical Services Advisory Committee has recommended the listing of Lutetium Imaging and Therapy for men with metastatic castration resistant prostate cancer.

The decision is a major step forward for Australian men and families facing prostate cancer, providing a pathway for the subsidisation of LuPSMA and other life-saving nuclear medicines in Australia.

The recommendation follows three years of

advocacy by PCFA .

This treatment is aimed at men who are advancing in disease, despite treatment with second-line ADT.

PCFA now awaits the Government's response to the Committee's recommendation, and will meet with the Minister for Health and Ageing to call for action.

PCFA's ultimate goal is to ensure that new and emerging treatments like this are made available to Australian men without delay.

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## Surgeons gain a second pair of eyes: Glowing dye helps identify rogue cancer cells

Scientists in the UK have found that a fluorescent dye attached to a molecular marker can help identify small prostate cancer cells that aren't visible to the naked eye during surgery. The dye improves the ability of surgeons to excise all cancerous tissues, reducing the likelihood of recurrence, while sparing healthy tissues and nerves.

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### New rules on what Medicare will fund for PSA testing

Basically several new or altered item numbers have been introduced.

For screening purposes in the average patient it is restricted to once every 23 months. If there is a suspicious lesion, then you may have another repeat test with free PSA within a given period.

- If you are at high family risk you can repeat every 11 months.
- Patients who are being followed for a defined suspicious level may have up to 4 tests over following 11 months.
- Patients with prostate cancer being monitored have no restriction.

BUT your Medicare rebate depends upon the following issues:

1. Have you been bulkbilled for the pathology or not? Due to increasing pressures on pathology companies and overall reduction of Medicare rebate benefits, some companies have drastically cut back on bulk billing and are only offering it to concession card holders. Remember that bulk billing means the provider is giving you a discount, NOT the government.
2. Did you forget to sign the bulkbilling entry on the path form?
3. Did the person who ordered the pathology put sufficient information on the path form? Specifically:

(a) did the pathology provider put PSA or PSA-previous prostate cancer or PSA-followup of previous abnormal test etc? The item number for PSA previous cancer is different to PSA, and if the latter number is billed, there will be no refund if within 23 months of the previous one.

(b) The Medicare billing also includes an item for collection fee.

4. IF the \$108 is the complete fee and not just the gap for the testing, then you may apply to Medicare for a partial refund. It is via the Medicare part of the MyGOV site. You will need to scan in your bill and receipt.

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### Long-course vs short-course androgen deprivation therapy plus postoperative radiotherapy for prostate cancer

*The Lancet* (16 May 2024) reported on the RADICALS-HD trial that compared the efficacy of long-course (24 months) versus short-course (6 months) androgen deprivation therapy (ADT) in addition to postoperative radiotherapy as a treatment for patients with intermediate- or high-risk localised prostate cancer.

After a median follow-up of 8.9 years, the longer course was associated with improved metastasis-free survival. The 10-year rates were 78.1% with long-course ADT and 71.9% with short-course ADT. Time to salvage ADT was also improved; however, no differences were noted in overall survival. Higher toxicity rates were observed with long-course ADT.

These results suggest that longer courses of ADT are associated with improved outcomes in patients with intermediate- or high-risk prostate cancer but need to be weighed against known associated adverse events.
